
Educator Losses To Inflation

Each year that the Legislature votes to suspend voter-approved cost-of-living adjustments (COLAs), staff in Washington's public schools lose buying power. In 2012-13, funded classified staff salaries are an average of \$3,146 lower than they would have been if adjusted for inflation; base salaries for new and experienced certificated educators are \$3,754 and \$7,076 lower, respectively, than they would have been if adjusted for inflation.^{1,2,3}





^{3.} Classified positions do not require teaching certificates but often require other training and credentials (paraeducators, janitors, bus drivers, office assistants, and others).

Educator Losses To Inflation

Although voters approved cost-of-living adjustments (COLAs) for teachers and other public school employees, the Legislature has suspended COLA funding for the foreseeable future. The result: classified staff salaries are 9.1 percent less and certificated salaries are 10.1 percent less than they would have been if adjusted for inflation.*
